Update on Truman Olson Site By Sara Richards

At a public hearing at the Catholic Multicultural Center on Thursday, July 10, city staff presented the two proposals for the Truman Olson Army Reserve site at 1402 South Park Street requested by the CDA subcommittee. The first includes housing for the formerly homeless provided by Porchlight or Goodwill. The second concentrates on economic development for the area. (The subcommittee had decided previously the site was not a good fit for the two educational entities that had been interested.)

Because the federal government gives preference to homeless services, the city would get the property free if the Porchlight or Goodwill proposal was accepted. The city must buy the site if the economic development proposal goes forward.

The majority of the speakers were in favor of the Porchlight proposal by a more than 3-1 margin. Nevertheless, the CDA subcommittee voted in favor of the economic development proposal also committing to finding and buying an alternate site for Porchlight. This has been presented at the City Council and referred to 4 committees for further action before coming back to the council for a vote.

At the BCNA meeting on July 14 a motion was passed by the majority of those present to express BCNA's support of Porchlight's original proposal. Many of those present had been favorably impressed by Porchlight's presentation at the March public meeting. Porchlight's proposal fits the Wingra BUILD Plan, permitting the extension of Cedar Street and would use minimal space to increase the housing density in the area.

ALDER UPDATE

(This is an edited version of an email sent by 13th District Alder Julia Kerr on June 12, 2008. If you are interested in receiving regular updates from Julia, please email her using the contact information on the back page.)

Monroe Regent Hotel: This has been exhaustively covered in the news media and there is a good bit of history here, but I wanted to explain directly to District 13 residents why I am approaching this with such a high degree of caution. At last week's City Council I succeeded in making motion to have a draft of the deed restriction returned to the Plan Commission for a final review to ensure that it reflected the elements of the project that has been publicly promised, i.e., a quiet boutique hotel that I agree would be a good addition to the area.

Unfortunately, the developer and his team have worked hard to portray me as an anti-development obstructionist. I want to let constituents know that this developer has a substantial and publicly documented history of non-compliance with Madison's building code and zoning regulations that are cause for great concern.

Suffice to say, I would not be going through all this if I did not feel that it was absolutely necessary to make sure that what the developer has repeatedly promised is what actually occurs. All that said, it is my hope that we can hammer-out the exact language of the deed restriction that will allow the project to move forward as the quiet, boutique hotel that the developer has represented.

Metro Route 13: I worked closely earlier this month with County Supervisor Shelia Stubbs, Bay Creek resident T.J. Mertz, and Alder Brian Solomon to preserve funding for this route, which will be adjusted slightly beginning in August (see Option 2). Fortunately, service to the pool, South Transfer Point, and Huber Center will be preserved. I also want to thank the Town of Madison, County Board Chair Scott McDonnell, County Executive Kathleen Falk, and Supervisor Kyle Richmond for their support of this very important South Madison bus route.

Penn Park: There are many South Madison neighbors who are working hard on safety at Penn Park and Captain Jim Wheeler of the Madison Police Department has let me know that they are increasing patrols in the area. Obviously, violence in and around a park is a huge concern for all of us, but I have been extremely thankful to all the participants in the Partners for Penn Park group that has been working hard and refuse to let bad behavior by a small group of people define the neighborhood and the park.

I also want to acknowledge the efforts of former Alder Isadore Knox in establishing the **South Madison Peace Partners**, a group of community members working to promote peaceful relationships in South Madison. Volunteers represent area churches, neighborhood associations, community organizations and neighbors working in collaboration with the Madison Police Department to promote a safe and violence free community. I hope people will call the Nehemiah Business Service Center, 608-467-1100 to learn more about this important community-based organization. A BIG THANK YOU to the Evjue Foundation for their support of South Madison Peace Partners. Isadore and I were at our wits end trying to find money to buy t-shirts and radios for the volunteers. I had a very quick phone conversation with Dave Zwiefel from the foundation (and Cap Times) and the next day we had their commitment for start-up for the group. Thank you, thank you!!

Workforce Housing: Many people know that I have been working on a workforce housing--a movement to encourage people to live closer to their workplaces--effort with an initial focus on the Greeenbush and Vilas neighborhoods. I am thrilled that the two associations were awarded a city grant to beginning planning a pilot project.

With a great deal of effort by Gary Brown from UW, we completed a survey of employees of UW, UW Hospital, Meriter, and St. Mary's that indicates that there are a good number of people interested in living closer to work. I have also been acutely aware of the changing student housing rental market where many are opting to move out of single-family rentals in favor of downtown high-rises. While students will also have a place in our neighborhoods, we need to plan for a very different rental housing market and I hope workforce housing is the best mechanism to do that.

The grant effort was led by (Vilas neighbor and Meriter employee) Melissa Huggins, with great support from Greenbush neighbors Amy Rountree, Laura Gutknecht, and former alder Andy Heidt.

Goodman Pool: The Goodman Pool is excited to co-operate with the McFarland Spartan Sharks to offer a swim team the pool. This competitive swim team is open to the youth of Madison, 6 years and older, who have had previous swim lessons and are comfortable swimming at least two lengths of the pool. Recycling: The City of Madison has a new recycling program. Madison residents can now bring many previously unrecyclable plastic items at 1501 W. Badger Road. These items, called mixed rigid plastics include empty garbage cans, toys, buckets, milk/soda crates, laundry baskets, lawn furniture, etc. There are some plastic items that cannot be recycled in this program including; PVC pipe/tubing, vinyl siding, plastic film (grocery bags & stretch film), Styrofoam, water hoses, hazardous materials, medical waste, chemical and petroleum barrels, and pesticide/herbicide containers. Artists Among Us

In this issue we feature Betty Bracey, whose painting "Alien Babies" is part of an art exhibit at the Overture Center. Betty Bracey lived at Romnes Apartments in Bay Creek for 15 years so even though she just moved out of the neighborhood, she still counts as a Bay Creek artist. Betty also attends St. Mark's in Bay Creek and works on the Backyard Mosaic project on the Hickory Street wall of the church.



Betty is a former board member of the arts and wellness organization Cornucopia, a member-run group of people with mental health issues and their allies incorporated in 1997. The people who established Cornucopia wanted to use it to offer one another support and to give themselves a break from their issues by expressing themselves through the arts. Cornucopia holds art classes and rents studio space at Porchlight, 306 N. Brooks St., right next to the UW campus.

Cornucopia has had art exhibits at the Madison Public Library and in the CitiArts Space in the Municipal Building, but this is the first time they've been at the Overture Center and members are pretty pleased about that. "This is our first opportunity to get in here," Betty said at an artist reception on July 13. "We waited a long time. I think this is a big thing, getting in here."

The 26-piece exhibit, which hangs in Gallery II on the second floor, is titled "Crazy." It's an examination of the concept from the point of view of people who may have been labeled with that word. "We are capable people," wrote Mary Nelson in an essay about the exhibit. "We have a wisdom of our own, and we are inviting the community as a whole to understand us."

Betty's piece--titled Alien Babies--"has to do with children that have been alienated and neglected," she says. Certainly, this colorful painting is a thought-provoking work of art. Betty is also working on a painting of the 12 apostles, which is almost done, and three other paintings. An arts store gives her scraps to work with, since her funds are limited and art supplies are expensive. Betty has done artistic T-shirts in the past and will be doing T-shirt art with St Mark's Promise program for families, held at St. Mark's Wednesday evenings during the school year.

Betty says she has been artistic all her life. About 15 years ago she decided it would be worth taking up again. Thank you, Betty, for sharing your artistic talent with the community.
