Whole Pet Veterinary Clinic By Sara Richards

At Whole Pet Veterinary Clinic, disease prevention is where it all begins. Veterinarians Megan Caldwell and Lisa Olson integrate traditional Western medicine practices with various Eastern therapeutic modalities. In their second year in business, the practice has been growing steadily, thanks to neighborhood support! Almost every visit includes a discussion about nutrition. Drs. Caldwell and Olson see this as the primary factor contributing to a pet's good health—after all, more than 60% of the entire immune system lives in the gastrointestinal tract.

Dr. Caldwell has been practicing small animal and emergency medicine in Madison for the past 11 years. A native of Madison and a resident of the Greenbush neighborhood, Dr. Caldwell attended Madison East High School. Dr. Olson is a native of Cottage Grove and a graduate of Monona Grove High School. They met at the University of Wisconsin School of Veterinary Medicine where they both graduated in 1999.

They stress that good nutrition for your pet does not mean spending a fortune. You should avoid certain ingredients (meat by-products and corn) and steer clear of chemical preservatives; try to supplement the balanced pet food you choose with up to 20% fresh "real food", and consider nutritional supplements. For cats they recommend wet foods to promote hydration and kidney health. Provide as much variety as possible -- different brands, different flavors—and your pet's overall health will likely improve.

While their emphasis starts with nutrition, they do not ignore the fundamentals; their list of services includes surgery, dentistry, behavior consultation, acupuncture, spinal manipulation, vaccines and other treatments as well as options for house calls.

Primate Research by Sara Richards

Rick Marolt, a Bay Creek resident, addressed the most recent BCNA meeting about monkey experimentation. He proposed that the neighborhood association adopt a resolution for a task force to look into whether or not primates should be used in experiments. The vote will occur at the next BCNA meeting on Monday, March 8, 2010.

Text of the resolution: Understanding that Madison has become the monkey experimentation capital of the United States and that profound similarities between monkeys and people raise a serious ethical issue, the Bay Creek Neighborhood Association asks Madison's Common Council and the Dane County Board of Supervisors to create a task force of experts to determine whether or not the continuing use of non-human primates in basic biomedical research is ethically justified. We also ask that the proposed expansion of primate laboratories at the UW–Madison be postponed until the task force issues its final report.

If you are interested in voting on this resolution or have suggestions to modify it, please plan to attend the next BCNA meeting.

<u>Background information from Rick Marolt</u>: About 9500 monkeys are used each year in laboratories in Madison. Roughly 2000 of them are in UW-Madison labs; others are at Covance. Federal taxpayers pay UW-Madison about \$50 million per year to conduct the experiments.

On January 8, 2010, WKOW posted the following on its website:

A UW committee decided its review of proposed scientific research projects involving primates is sufficient to answer ethical questions about the animal research.

The fourteen members of the all animal care and use committee voted unanimously in support of a statement of the committee's current standards in evaluating scientific research with monkeys.

Committee member and UW associate bioethics professor Robert Streiffer acknowledged animal suffering from the campus scientific work. "We currently allow research that causes harm and premature death."

But committee member Eric Sandgren said the committee's consideration of proposed scientific projects included exploration of alternatives to using monkeys; procedures causing the least distress for the animals; and verification the goals of the research were convincing enough to justify use of the animals....

BCNA Meeting of January 11, 2010

The Treasurer reported that the association has \$1,957 in the account (\$959 in the newsletter account, and \$997 in the general fund account). She noted that there is no second signer on the account and a second signer should be added. She also introduced the idea of selling advertising on the neighborhood website.

The Web Committee report that a community member offered to donate website space to the neighborhood. With this donation, the only cost to the neighborhood will be for the domain name which should be about \$12 per year.

The Newsletter Editor reported that the Feburary/March edition will be delivered during the last week of January. There is a delivery route open for an area bounded by Olin, Lakeside, Whittier, and Lowell and anyone interested should contact Sara Richards.

Kyle Richmond, the County Board Supervisor representing the neighborhood, is organizing a multi-neighborhood meeting to be scheduled in February at the Arboretum. The purpose of the meeting will be to discuss county's recent Shoreland Zoning changes as well as other possible topics including the Regional Transit Authority and the County's sustainable agriculture initiative.

Sara Richards reported that Michele Walker will no longer be BCNA's police department liaison. However, Sergeant Jim Dexheimer from the South District provided assurance that the department will continue its commitment to improving Olin Park.

A neighborhood resident introduced the idea of placing bird feeders along trails in Olin Park. He mentioned that a park in Ottawa, Canada has birdfeeders along cross-country trails and skiers can often be seen stopping to watch birds and feed them by hand. It was suggested that he get in touch with the Parks Department to pursue this idea.

The Neighborhood Contact Person reported on the recently released neighborhood grant program by the City. The City is hosting a workshop on January 26 at the Hawthorne Library to provide more information. Grants can fund projects related to Community Enhancement, Neighborhood Leadership, and Neighborhood Planning. It was also noted that BCNA was slated to receive CDBG funding through the Southside planning completed in 2002-2003 but those funds were not received.

The Burr Oaks neighborhood association challenged the other Southside neighborhoods to match their \$500 pledge to the South Madison Library. Those present suggested posting a notice in the Bulletin providing the opportunity to donate to BCNA to meet this challenge.

Judy Robinson did some research into replacing the neighborhood welcome signs given the hole currently in one of them. She was quoted a price of \$1,500 to replace one of the signs of \$4,000 to replace all three.

A neighborhood resident gave a short presentation on inhumane treatment of monkeys involved in experimentation in Madison. He requested that the neighborhood association formally express support for a more open dialogue on this topic. Those present agreed to post notice of the issue and the request in the Bulletin and take it up at the next meeting.

Prior to the November meeting, the Greenbush Neighborhood Association had contacted Bob Stoffs about revising the Bay Creek Neighborhood boundaries so that the area between Delaplaine Court and Haywood Street would be part of Greenbush instead of Bay Creek. Notice of this request was posted in the previous newsletter and those present voted unanimously to make the amendment.

Atom: An Odyssey from the Big Bang to Life on Earth...and Beyond by Lawrence M. Krauss.

In this book, using lighthearted wit, Krauss follows the arc of a single oxygen atom from the moment of the Big Bang through billions of years up to the creation of life on Earth. He then fast forwards to show the eventual fate of our planet and the oxygen atom's likely demise following the Sun's supernova. Backed by the latest research findings from the fields of physics, astronomy and biology, the author follows the oxygen atom's long, eventful journey through the cosmos. Written for the general reader, one does not need a science background to comprehend his thrilling description of the events which lead to the creation of our solar system. Highlighting the immensity of time involved in this process, Krauss shows human existence is barely a blip on the radar--merely an interesting sideline in an ever expanding universe. While he uses far too many exclamation points throughout the book, he can probably be forgiven for this misstep considering the subject matter. After following this atom's fascinating odyssey, I felt both humbled and awed.
