Bay Creek Jan 13, 2014 Meeting Minutes By Carol Medaris

The meeting was called to order at 6:30 by Jim Winkle.

INTRODUCTIONS Because there were many new faces, we began the meeting with introductions all around. SOUTHSIDE COMMUNITY POLICING Officer Steve Magyera of the Madison Police Department, in his first year with the Southside team, described some of the issues the team deals with. He emphasized that it is not a patrolling unit but one that responds proactively to issues that arise, e.g. executing search warrants; responding to domestic abuse; dealing with "problem houses;" and investigating local robberies/burglaries like the armed home invasions in the Vilas Park area last fall (often driven by heroin habits). He said there have been many fewer calls/problems at both Brittingham and Olin Parks, and gave some reasons for this progress, but said there is still work to be done. There were questions raised and discussions about 1) the use of weapons in one's house in response to a burglary; and 2) what situations were appropriately directed to 911.

EDIBLE LANDSCAPING Judy Robinson asked for volunteers to be involved on an ongoing basis in working on this project, and announced a meeting scheduled for January 21st. This is the last portion of the new sign project. COUNTY BOARD UPDATE Kyle Richmond reported that there is money in the budget for jail reconfiguration, em-

phasizing that this was not an "expansion' or a new jail, but a reconfiguration of some cells, updating some spaces, and consolidation of services. The county continues to move in the direction of concentrating incarceration on violent people while keeping those, for example, with mental health problems out of jail.

Kyle announced that there will be two county ballot questions on April 1st, one concerning the legalization of marijuana and the other concerning non-partisan redistricting.

Regarding conservation issues, the county is purchasing an easement to conserve land along the Sugar River south of Verona, next to a larger parcel purchased last year from the Bruce Company. Kyle also reported briefly on the leak in the county's first manure digester, which alarmed Waunakee citizens, and progress being made on the second manure digester in the Town of Bristol.

SCHMIDT AUTO YARD EXPANSION This issue has been successfully resolved.

FRIENDS OF OLIN TURVILLE PARK (FOOT) Tom DeChant passed out nicely done notices for the next Candlelight Ski and Hot Chocolate event on Saturday, February 15th from 6 to 9 p.m. Non-skiers are invited to enjoy the hot chocolate, and there will be hiking if the snow is gone.

There is a natural bird walk every 2nd Saturday from 10 to 12 noon, with people meeting at the large parking lot at the end of Olin Ave. There is also a new bluebird trail in Quam Park.

We discussed the issue of the lack of hiking trails in Olin Turville, as the trails groomed for skiing are off-limits for hiking. And, some other county parks have snow shoe trails, but not Olin Turville.

BY LAWS COMMITTEE Ron Shutvet said that the committee hasn't had time to get together since the discussion at our regular meeting in November, but will announce a meeting soon. Those with questions or concerns about the by laws are invited to attend and the plan is to have a rough draft of the meeting minutes for our regular March BCNA meeting.

TREASURERS REPORT Judy Robinson reported that money is available for the next few bulletins, but that we are still coming up a bit short for each issue. Late payments by some advertisers is a problem.

A facilitator for next meeting is to be announced.

The meeting adjourned at 7:45

Bay Creek Even Has Iron Casters (Artists Among Us) By Pam Gates

One of the more amazing Bay Creek residents I've met is Alisa Toninato, an artist whose medium is cast iron. She owns two companies, American Skillet and Felion Studios, which has nothing to do with cats. Headquarters are a shop south

of the Beltline, where Alisa mixes her mold materials in a cement mixer, lifting the 100-pound sacks of sand into the mixer by herself!

The shop, a fascinating chaos, includes a portable furnace that she and her partner, Andrew McManigal, built. The day we met, they had just gotten back from an iron pour with the UW-Platteville Department of Metallurgy. The iron-casting community is uniquely interested in collaboration, she said.

Andrew is a carpenter, "an amazing craftsman with an old Irishman's soul...He does all the woodworking and has slowly gotten into metal fabrication. He's inventive and good at the operations," she says.

Alisa earned a Bachelor of Fine Arts degree in sculpture but has moved on in many ways. What really got her moving was her idea to create cast-iron skillets in the shapes of states. She made the patterns out of wood and archived them by making a silicon mold and then a plaster one. "I use a water-based chemistry called sodium silicate. A lot of chemistries are toxic, and I stay away from them."

American Skillet is taking her skillets commercial, selling through eight mostly Wisconsin retailers. The focus is on Illinois-, Wisconsin-, and Minnesota-shaped skillets. They hope to get a big retailer.

"We work a lot in New York," Alisa says.. "We just did an event with the Food Network." She recounted her experience with Martha Stewart, who recently started an awards program called 'American Made.' Awards are given to 10 companies in 10 different categories each year, and American Skillet was honored the first year. The awardees appeared in Stewart's magazine and on the show. "All this happened one month before Christmas," Alisa recalled. "Everything just snowballed. It was like riding a dragon. It was awe-some!"

Now they contract with another Wisconsin company to make the skillets, because demand is unpredictable. She works directly with the pattern makers and on quality control. Last year they did a lot more promotion; this year they've been trying out trade shows. "We're still very much figuring it out," she says. "Our story is truly a story of art to industry. It's been a crash course in business.

"I'm excited about the commercial world: its bigness, the many parts working together. We ride a roller coaster, relying on our intuitions, flying by the seat of our pants. Working with other people is how I learn.

"We want to make it worth it for all who have helped us along the way," she says. "They've been instrumental to us pushing forward in the startup phase. You take a lot of risks, and it costs a lot of money."

But it's clear she's having a lot of fun! (Felion, by the way, gets its name from the periodic table symbol for iron, Fe, and Alisa's birth sign, Leo.)

News from Olin-Turville By Andria Blattner

There is going to be a Nature and Bird walk on Saturday, February 8, in Turville Conservation Park 10:00 to 11:30 a.m. In fact, there will be a walk the second Saturday of every month. This is a new series sponsored by Bird City Madison, Audubon, City Parks and FOOT. Each walk will emphasize the natural events of the season. Meet in lower parking lot at the end of Olin Ave.

The first walk, on January 11, was led by Jeff Steele who is very experienced in leading nature walks. Paul Noeldner had a fire pit and table set up with guide books, hot chocolate and treats. He was there to answer questions, talk about winter adaptations and to find birds with his spotting scope. There was a lot of activity in the park that day - Frisbee golfers and skiers – although the trails were so icy most skiers gave it up and we could hike.

There were lots of birds: woodpeckers, red-bellied, hairy and downy, black-capped chickadees, white-breasted nuthatches, crows, a cardinal, pigeons, a blue jay, a goldfinch and a bluebird!! No raptors were seen which was a little surprising, since a red tailed hawk usually hangs out here. We saw evidence of many mammals – squirrels left quite a mess under the branches where they had eaten walnuts or hickory nuts, rabbit tracks were everywhere and for quite a long distance on the trail by the lake we followed the tracks of a raccoon carrying a prey animal by seeing the tracks occasionally and the drops of blood along the trail. It was easy to identify two trees – shagbark hickory and walnuts since the nuts were still on them.

In February the "walk" will be on cross country skis – but only easy trails – because all the trails in Turville are groomed and there is no hiking or snowshoeing on groomed trails. Jeff will lead the walk and Paul will ready with hot chocolate. We are planning for a wonderful snowy, winter day, maybe with a few snowflakes in the air so we can examine them with magnifying glasses. But who knows what the weather will be like then Whatever it is, we will find something interesting.
